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### **Coaching Tips**

## Talk To The Target, Please! By Steve Ruis



A coach's first goal is to get an archer to a level of proficiency that the feedback they are getting from the target is indicative of what they are doing. At that point, an archer needs to learn, in essence, how to have a conversation with the target. This may sound a little weird, but there is an ongoing dialogue between a competitive archer and his target. Here is how it goes.

Let's say you are working your way through a field round and you are shooting quite well, but for some reason, your arrows start hitting just below the five-ring, where they were grouped nicely on the center before. The question you have to answer now is: "Is it me or is it my equipment?"

To break this down, a number of things have to happen. First you need to evaluate whether you have been making good shots. This comes in two parts: the first being your ability to feel whether your shots have been solid or not which comes from paying attention to each shot. Most accomplished archers can "replay" their most recent shot in their minds to see if anything felt incorrect. The second part is you need to keep track of your most common form and execution flaws (hopefully a short list) and then you go down that list from most probable cause to the least. Did I drop my bow arm on that shot? Was my wrist too high? Everyone has their own lists for missing high, low, left, and right.

If you can identify a form mistake, you need to concentrate a bit more on doing that thing correctly, but just a little bit and see if that fixes the problem. If you focus too hard on one form element, others will go awry on you and now you have another problem.

If you have eliminated yourself as the cause, the next thing to check is your equipment. Again, you need to keep checklists of equipment causes of missing high, low, left, and right. You also need to check your bow to make sure nothing has loosened and moved around. For low misses, the cause could be your string has stretched or your rest has moved down, or your nocking point has moved up, etc. All of these things you need to be prepared to check.

For a single miss, if you can't figure out what happened you have to focus on making your next shot a good shot to see if you just had an inexplicable miss or you are grouping in the wrong place. This can be costly during a competition.

Talking to the target out loud can get you a reputation, but talking to your target in the privacy of your own mind can make you a better archer.

As we transition into the Indoor Shooting Season, now is a great time to review some Safety Rules to follow while at the range.

- 1. Make sure the line and range are clear before shooting.
- 2. Be careful when pulling your arrows. Make sure no one is standing behind as you are pulling. You could put an eye out!
- 3. Do NOT shoot straight up or at another person. Should this occur, you will be asked to leave the range.
  - 4. All archers must shoot from the same line. Majority rules.
  - 5. When others are at the range, shoot at a distance where you can consistently hit the target. Other shooters should not be inconvenienced while you look for arrows.
  - 6. Communicate with your fellow archers. Be courteous to one another. Ask relevant questions, etc. to insure that safety and enjoyment of the sport can be shared by all.
